Dear Ms. Salas:

On behalf of the Fixed Wireless Communications Coalition (FWCC), and as an accommodation to the Independent Cable & Telecommunications Association (ICTA), I am filing this response to a procedural issue raised in the Consolidated Reply of Hughes Electronics Corporation, filed on November 28, 2000 (Hughes Consolidated Reply).

Hughes requests that the Commission "not consider" the Comments filed by the FWCC, and the Opposition to Partial Reconsideration filed by ICTA, both on November 13, 2000, on the ground that the FWCC and ICTA failed to serve Hughes with their pleadings.¹ Hughes alleges it was prejudiced because of the delay in discovering these filings.²

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The failure of both parties to serve Hughes was inadvertent. But the omission was also harmless, and did not prejudice Hughes.

First, Hughes in fact located both pleadings. Hughes established that it had actual notice by responding to both pleadings in detail.³

Second, if Hughes nonetheless believed it was prejudiced by the delay in discovering these pleadings, it could have requested an extension of the reply date.⁴

Third, Hughes may still study the pleadings at its leisure and reply further in an ex parte filing.

Fourth, Hughes's request that the Commission disregard these pleadings is not properly before the Commission, due to Hughes's own procedural lapse. Section 1.429(g) limits replies in the reconsideration phase to 10 pages. While all other parties appear to have complied with this page limitation, the Hughes Consolidated Reply runs to 16 pages. Hughes included in its filing a brief footnote requesting a waiver of the page limit,⁵ but the Commission's Rules clearly and specifically require that permission to exceed the page limit be sought and obtained well *in advance* of the date the pleading is actually filed.⁶ Because the Hughes Consolidated Reply did not comply with these requirements, it must be rejected.

Both the FWCC and ICTA strongly support and practice civility in their dealings before the Commission. The FWCC and ICTA believe the public interest is best served by responding to opponents on the merits of the issues, rather than procedural technicalities. Ordinarily neither group would raise objections to an over-long pleading, nor move to strike for failure to serve a pleading of which it had actual notice. In that spirit, the FWCC and ICTA would be pleased to drop their objection to the Hughes

Although the due date for reconsideration petitions is fixed by statute, 47 U.S.C. Sec. 405(a), the Commission is free to establish and revise the dates for comments and replies.
